

Library Management Services

Being an important component in providing resources for better learning of our students and researchers, the Library Services Office was able to cater its clientele with efficiency. For the months of January to March 2018, a total of forty nine thousand three hundred forty four (49,344) library users including accommodated library patrons at the Reading Area and those who utilize library resources were served by the office. 

The graph shows that most library users go to the Main Campus Library to utilize library collection and services with twelve thousand eight hundred sixty six (12,866) users. It is followed by San Isidro Library with six thousand nine hundred thirty (6,930) clients. Jose V. Yap Library, College of Engineering Library and College of Law Library came in third, fourth and fifth with four thousand six hundred ninety five (4,695), two thousand eight hundred forty five (2,845) and seven hundred thirty two (732) users respectively.




